PARISH FINANCE NEWS & UPDATE

Fr Tom has appointed Dominic Lo Surdo to the Finance Committee and he was welcomed at the Meeting on 26th August. Ruth Rawlinson has commenced as Parish Bookkeeper. Ruth is working from home during Covid. Contact with Ruth is accounts@stpatsmortlake.org.au. Welcome Ruth and Dominic.

Parish assets at September are \$217,000 plus the donated funding for the statue and in part mural. Surplus has been aided by the fundraising for pillars, blocks and bricks. **Thank you to all parishioners who have generously supported St Pats.**

During lockdown circumstances have changed with Parish (Second Collection) Income down to approx. \$5000 per month. Our "standing costs" for salaries, services, insurance, etc being \$9000 per month. Our annual insurance bill is now due, at \$20,756 which is 20% higher than last year.

The first collection income, which goes to a central fund to meet priest stipend and presbytery costs, has been minimal during the lock down period.

Parishes consequently are required, during Covid, to meet proportion of Presbytery costs previously met from the Diocese. **Applications have been made for available NSW Government subsidies for Cash Flow (\$15,000) and wages.** We await that outcome.

In terms of planned "major" works,
1. Hall. It was decided to move as far as DA application and review its timing as we exit Covid closures and "certainty" returns. The approval process will take time as it requires Diocese (AoEA) approval before submission of the DA. Funding sources will be considered across various avenues including Government Grants, Donation, Parish and borrowing

2. Church maintenance, propose to get a range of minor work (flooring, cracked walls) done during lock down. These will extend the timeframe for a more major overhaul.

Major concern is a regular weekly income especially taking into account the many personal demands on parishioners plus those of needy ministries, Vinnies, CWF, Priest Retirement, Refugees, etc. **Again, thank you for your ongoing support in this most difficult time.**

A reading from the letter of St James
Jas 3:16 – 4:3

Justice is the harvest of peacemakers from seeds sown in a spirit of peace.

Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it. Peacemakers, when they work for peace, sow the seeds which will bear fruit in holiness.

Where do these wars and battles between yourselves first start? Isn't it precisely in the desires fighting inside your own selves? You want something and you haven't got it; so you are prepared to kill. You have an ambition that you cannot satisfy; so you fight to get your way by force. Why you don't have what you want is because you don't pray for it; when you do pray and don't get it, it is because you have not prayed properly, you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

Mk 9:30-37

The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of humanity ... All who wish to be first must make themselves the servants of all.

After leaving the mountain Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest.

So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

CHILDREN'S LITURGY

When we read and listen to the Gospel, we learn the way Jesus lived when He was on this earth. We see he was kind, loving and full of mercy toward others. **In today's reading Jesus talks about the first being last and the last being first** – this is a bit strange for us as we are always told to try our best and when we do this we can aim high and sometimes we might even win a prize and come first for our efforts.

It is normal for us to want to be noticed and sometimes we want to feel important and honoured. Jesus is not saying this is wrong but he does want us to think about why we do what we do. When we do things for other people to serve them, to make them happy this is a wonderful gift. Let's listen to Fr Tom read today's Gospel:
